> School Communities Engagement Strategy

This strategy aims to deliver a program of activities and supporting resources that reduce the risk of fire and other emergencies on school communities. These will be developed and implemented in collaboration and in partnership with teachers, students, education authorities, professional associations and NSW RFS Members.

> Get Ready Schools Program

School communities at a glance



There are 3,136 schools in New South Wales.



885 Schools are located on Bush Fire Prone Land.



4,000 teachers teaching about bush fire every year. 100,000 students learning about bush fire every year.

The NSW RFS uses *Mosaic* segmentation to identify, understand and tailor communication and engagement to at-risk communities. The *New Homes and New Hopes* and *International Infusion* segments have been identified as two at-risk segments of families with school age children across NSW that are on average less prepared for bush fire. NSW RFS should prioritise activities in schools where the Middle Australia segment and other identified at-risk segments dominate the local population in bush fire risk management and community engagement plans.

Method

The NSW RFS Community Engagement Team use the **TESTER** Framework to develop and implement these targeted engagement strategies. This strategy represents the output of the 'target' and 'explore' phases. As programs are delivered they will be rigorously trialled before expanded and reviewed for ongoing continuous improvement.
