Liverpool Range volunteers to be recognised for long service

The NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) Liverpool Range District will recognise and celebrate the dedication and commitment of long serving members at a special presentation this afternoon.

Member for Upper Hunter Michael Johnsen and NSW RFS Senior Assistant Commissioner Bruce McDonald will join local volunteers to present 38 Long Service medals at the ceremony to be held at the Liverpool Range Fire Control Centre.

"These members do not volunteer their time for the accolades, however these medals are a proud acknowledgement of the commitment shown by these individuals over the years," Mr Johnsen said.
