Sixteen students from Clarence Valley Anglican School (CVAS) have been congratulated by the NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) Clarence Valley District for their successful completion of the NSW RFS Secondary School Cadet Program.

NSW RFS Clarence Valley District cadet coordinator Ian Smith said the program is the ideal way to introduce young people to the important role volunteer fire fighters play within communities.
