Shoalhaven

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The Shoalhaven District is located on the New South Wales South Coast. The area covered is 4,531 km2, spanning 160 kilometres of coast between Berry to Durras Lake. The population of the Shoalhaven area is approximately 100,000. The major population centres are Nowra/Bomaderry, Jervis Bay/St Georges Basin villages and Ulladulla/Milton.

The area has high levels of tourism during the warmer months of the year, which can see the population increase to 320,000. There are also over 12,000 out of area owners of residential properties in Shoalhaven. These have been identified as potentially impacting on the ability of certain sections of the community to prepare for bush fire.

The Shoalhaven area has on average 600 bush fire per year, of which an average of twenty fires can be considered to be major fires. The main sources of ignition are:

- arson
- lightning
- accidental ignitions

Jervis Bay

The Jervis Bay fire management area is a Commonwealth Territory on the NSW South Coast. The area is 7530ha and includes Booderee National Park, Wreck Bay Aboriginal Land, Department of Defence Land and Commonwealth Leases.

The population of the fire management area fluctuates significantly through the seasons. The main residential areas are the villages of Jervis Bay, including HMAS Creswell and Wreck Bay. Small isolated residential areas are located in the Christians Minde and Lumeah localities (The Cove and RTBU). At maximum, when HMAS Creswell is at capacity, the residential population of the Territory is approximately 1,000. Up to another 1,000 campers can be located in Booderee National Park during peak visitation in summer and a further 600 accommodated in the Christian Minde and Lumeah localities.

High levels of tourism during December and January can see the population increase to near 3,000, with up to 1,500 additional visitors per day during the summer months. This has been identified as potentially impacting on the ability of certain sections for the community to prepare for bush fire.

The Jervis Bay Bush Fire Management Area has on average 3 bushfires per year of which an average of 20% over time have been major fires. The main sources of ignition are:

- arson
- accidental ignitions
- camp fires

- residential fires and tip fires
- prescribed burns
- lightning

The nominated Incident Management Facility for Shoalhaven and Jervis Bay fire management areas is the Shoalhaven District Fire Control Centre.

1.2. Topography

Terrain varies from coastal plains to mountain ranges and river gorges. Within the Shoalhaven boundaries are large areas of State Forest, National Parks and vacant Crown Land making up approximately 73 percent of the total area.

A number of waterways and lakes throughout the Shoalhaven with marine capability providing best access to isolated beaches, coves and points.

1.3. Vegetation

Vegetation varies from improved pasture in the farming areas, wet and dry swamps, wet and Dry Sclerophyll forests and rainforests, large areas of heath, State Forest plantations

1.4. Climate

The typical / average climate in the area is generally mild. Rainfall is more pronounced in Summer/Autumn. The bush fire season generally runs between September and March each year.

Weather conditions that bring fire weather to the area are north-westerly, westerly and south-westerly winds, accompanied by high daytime temperatures and low relative humidity. There are often lightning storms, occasionally dry, during the bushfire season.

Prevailing sea-breezes generally mitigate the effect of inland fire weather. However, the transition to fire weather on the coast can be extremely rapid.

Prevailing weather conditions during bush fire season (September to March) are north westerly winds accompanied by high day time temperatures and low relative humidity. There are often lightning storms, occasionally dry during the bushfire season.

1.6. Known Radio Comms Blackspots

- Areas West of Nowra around Burrier, Tallowal, Bulee, Sassafras, St George, Tolwong and Touga
- In and around Kangaroo Valley, Bendella, Budgong, Beaumont, Tallowa Dam
- Also areas of Tianjara, Jerrawangala, Endrick and Pointer Mountain
- Areas Between Tabourie and Batemans Bay, especially West of the Princes Highway Brooman,

1.7. Hazards

1.7.1. Transportation

The Princes Highway is the main transportation route running in North South direction through Nowra, Ulladulla and Batemans Bay. Most responses by the Districts busiest village brigades are to motor vehicle accidents (MVA). The Princes highway and surrounding areas have a significant number of accidents. The risk of MVAs are heightened during school holiday and seasonal periods due to the large influx of tourists to these areas.

There is also a Rail network terminating Bomaderry for passengers and commercial ending at Manildra Mill.

A small aerodrome to the North in Jaspers Brush.

Heightened aviation traffic with HMAS Creswell and HMAS Albatross aviation sections.

1.7.2. Infrastructure

A 132Kv South coast overhead feeder network from Wollongong through to Batemans Bay, predominately runs parallel with the Princes Highway

1.7.3. Tourism

The population of Shoalhaven District is approximately 110,000. The high levels of tourism during warmer months of the year can see the population increase to 330,000.

1.7.4. Defence Land

Tumut has one major highway passing through It (Snowy Mountains Highway). This corridor connects HMAS Creswell - is the naval academy of the Royal Australian Navy.

HMAS Albatross - HMAS Albatross is the largest operational Naval establishment and the Navy's only Air Station.

Tianjara unexploded ordinates (UXO) Area: 25,000 hectares of Defence land used for live ordinance training. Unexploded ordinance litters the area and impairs firefighting efforts. Located in the Moreton National Park. Tianjara Operational Procedures and Map here.

Beecroft UXO Peninsula: 4,200 hectares of Defence land used for live ordinance training. Unexploded ordinance also litters the area and impairs firefighting efforts. Located south of Currarong on the coastline and used by the Navy.
