NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) brigades from the Clarence Valley have celebrated their members' long and dedicated service at a ceremony held in their honour.

NSW RFS Acting Director of Regional Services Chief Superintendent John Parnaby presented 82 volunteer firefighters with Long Service Medals at an official ceremony in Grafton, where he also handed over the keys to a brand new fire truck.

Chief Superintendent Parnaby said the volunteers from brigades across the Clarence Valley have each made an invaluable contribution to local communities and are the backbone of the NSW RFS.

"Between them, these men and women have served with distinction for close to 1,190 years.

The volunteers were presented with their medals at today's ceremony where Chief Superintendent Parnaby also handed over the keys to a brand new bush fire truck to members of the Wooli Rural Fire Brigade.
