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OUR VISION

The Canobolas Zone of the NSW Rural Fire Service will be a leader in support and innovation to our volunteers who will provide the highest standard of excellence in the protection of our community from fires and other emergencies.

OUR MISSION

To provide a cohesive, enthusiastic Volunteer Rural Fire Service trained and equipped to meet the needs of the community in an efficient, effective and professional manner. Our leadership and management systems will equip our volunteers and brigades to be a leading and respected resource within the NSW Rural Fire Service.

1. Executive Overview

The 2010/2011 year has been filled with challenges and innovation within Canobolas Zone. The traditional fire season was replaced with a very wet summer period in which we saw crews having to adapt from meeting fire related responses to assisting communities and kindred agencies with flood response work.

Due to the wet weather the severity and volatility of fire related incidents attended by the Zone members was significantly reduced. This was a welcome respite from past drought conditions and provided opportunity for communities to reap some of the benefits of a wetter season.

Hazard reduction work was somewhat hampered due to the wetter conditions however during a two week window period significant hazard reduction was completed. This resulted in Canobolas Zone completing 14,202 hectares of hazard reduction. This amounted to 12.1% of the total works within the state of New South Wales and some 150% of our continuing yearly target for hazard reduction within Canobolas Zone.

Work was commenced on reviewing our Bush Fire Risk Management Plan which will allow the Zone to capitalise on the outstanding Canobolas Plan and further provide risk management that meets the needs of our member communities. The review will encompass an improved risk identification and rating process as well as expanding the assessment criteria used to demonstrate the results obtained.

Financially, we received a slightly smaller budget of \$6.84m which was down from the previous \$6.98M in 2009/2010. Whilst a reduction in budget we were able to meet our entire key performance criteria and ensure the future of the Zone.

Work commenced on the first Standard design Brigade Station at Lake Canobolas to accommodate the brigades of Canobolas and Nashdale. This is a first for the NSW RFS and despite some weather impacts the station is due for completion by the end of October 2011. The station will boast some of the highest standards of accommodation and facility enjoyed within Canobolas Zone.

The Canobolas Zone website was enhanced with the introduction of video presentations identifying some of the risks of the potential grass fire season. This demonstrated the innovation and role that the website has delivered to our communities. Of note was the fact that the website has become a foundation for additional websites across Regions West and East. Monthly usage continues to increase and we believe this will further increase as the website continues to remain an important communication medium of the Zone.

The commitment of our volunteers was recognised with a number of long service award ceremonies being conducted and in excess of sixty awards being presented by both Commissioner Shane Fitzsimmons and Assistant Commissioner Dominic Lane. A number of new tankers were also handed over to brigades at these ceremonies.

Work continued on the construction of the Larras Lee airstrip and improvements were made to the facilities at Orange and Cowra airports to add to our aviation infrastructure.

The Canobolas Zone continues to provide a significant level of support to our volunteers and communities and is well placed to ensure the standards and achievements to date are continued.

3. People

3.1 Membership

During the 2010/2011 period the total volunteer membership increased by 145 personnel across the four local government areas. Details of the membership numbers and the locations are shown in Table 1.

It is again, pleasing to note that volunteer numbers are increasing at a time where the anecdotal evidence continues to suggest a population decline and age increase across rural communities. There is no doubt that the average age of our membership is increasing and the challenge over the next decade will be the renewing our workforce whilst maintaining the local knowledge and fire behaviour and suppression capability that is interwoven into the skillset of our more senior members.

3.2 Staff.

Increasing workload and higher outcomes in hazard reduction and hazard management have maintained work pressures on staff. This is illustrated with Canobolas Zone being some 1.5% of the State in terms of responsibility and having completed 12.1% of the State hazard reduction works and some 15.98% of the State hazard complaints (526/3292) and 29% of Region West hazard complaints (526/1825).

3.3 Community Consultation.

Unfortunately the, now entrenched, program of consultation through our Gum Tree meetings was impacted slightly by the staff movements during this reporting period with significantly less meetings held. Whilst this concept is still proving very successful there has been an additional challenge in ensuring that the timing and locations meet the needs of individual members and that they can see a benefit in attending through input, action and empowerment.

The "Gum Tree" meeting brand is gradually being picked up by other districts across the State and has been incorporated into the Region West Business Plan for use across the Region.

The objectives of these meetings remain:

- To improve communication and understanding between our volunteers and staff.
- To build lasting and long term relationships and alliances with our volunteers and communities.
- To really engage with our volunteers by listening to their needs or concerns.
- The promotion of mutually beneficial results.
- Identify and build upon our common ground within the RFS.

3.4 Canobolas Zone Website.

The Canobolas Zone website continues to expand and improve to meet the needs of our volunteers and the wider community. The site at **http://www.canobolas.rfs.nsw.gov.au** has become the foundation for a number of equivalent sites within the NSW Rural Fire Service.

During the past year the information on the site has been enhanced with the introduction of additional video content aimed at providing our communities with the information to help mitigate the ensuing potential grass fire season. Information on Brigade activities, member opportunities and associated general fire related information and links remains the principal focus.

Media links will continue to be maintained to capture public news stories that relate to the NSW Rural Fire Service and the Canobolas Zone and its people.

The website is now showing, and recording, a first class history of the achievements over recent years and will assist in serving as a great resource for our communities and Brigades in detailing the events and communications as we move through the future.



3.5 Cadets.

The RFS Secondary Schools Cadet Programme is run over ten weeks and is open to Year 9 and Year 10 students. Schools in the Canobolas Zone who participated in the 2011 Programme include Cowra High School (11 students) and Orange Christian School (17 students).

Aims of the cadet training include developing an interest in the RFS and its traditions, provide knowledge of fire safety and preparedness and encouraging the cadets to continue an involvement in the RFS and community services and most importantly to provide a sense of community spirit and responsibility.

Students were given hands-on demonstrations of RFS vehicles and equipment, hand tools, communications and casualty assistance. They also gained an understanding of the roles of other emergency services when they attended at the CHC Helicopter base, Blayney SES and Orange SES.

The Programme is overseen by Canobolas Zone staff and the training is provided by several volunteer members for each school.

3.6 Learning and Development

Another successful year of training was conducted within the Zone, by our staff and volunteers. During the year a total of 428 persons (BF RPL inclusive) were deemed competent in 14 various RFS qualifications. A large number of volunteers also attended various local workshops during the year.

Canobolas was successful with grants from the RFSA in excess of \$30,000 for the funding of CABA refilling station and 2 Oxy Resuscitation Kits for Advanced Resuscitation Techniques training.

The Region West Exercise was well attended again this year with 2 complete strike teams attending gaining valuable experience and knowledge in the latest fire fighting techniques and procedures.

The Zone is continuing to work towards meeting Service Standard 6.1.2 which provides details on the required qualifications for all levels of the organisation, volunteer or staff. During the past year the focus has been on the Bush Firefighter (BF) qualification with two hundred and fifty five volunteer members from Blayney, Cabonne and Cowra LGA's being recognised through this BF RPL process.

Training is still being taken out to the brigades as requested or held close to where the majority of the participants, on a particular course, reside. The Orange Molong Road Brigade Station has also been utilised for training workshops one Saturday each month during winter with volunteers from all over the Canobolas Zone attending. The workshops have proved to be very popular with the Canobolas Zone volunteers and will recommence at the end of the fire season.

3.7 Financial

The Canobolas Zone received a total allocation from the Rural Fire Fighting Fund of \$6,845,400 for the 2010/2011 year. Each Council received the allocation as shown in Table 3:

Our Councils are responsible for contributing 11.7% to the total budget.

4.1 Hazard Reduction results

The Hazard reduction season was reduced due to the wet weather which only allowed all land managers to conduct burns for two weeks.

4.2 Hazard Complaints & Permits

The hazard reduction component of Rural Fire Service activities in now undertaken expressly by the Canobolas Zone on behalf of the Councils and entails four separate areas

- 1. Issue of Fire Permits
- 2. Issue of Hazard Reduction Certificates
- 3. Management of Hazard Complaints
- 4. Advice on Compliance to "Planning for Bushfire Protection" in regard to Development Applications.

Since 1 July 2010 and up to 30 June 2011 the Activities Staff of Canobolas Zone carried out the following works as listed in Table 7.

4.3 Fire and Emergency Incidents

Fire Season 2010/2011 saw a wetter spring and summer period that minimised the risk of severe fire activity during the Bush Fire Danger Period.

Whilst there were no fires of significance during the reporting period, the statistics as displayed in TABLE 9 show that the year's activity level of 396 incidents was comparable to the previous three years. This is critically important to the viability of the volunteer brigade's operational capability, as a general lack of activity can often have a detrimental impact on the responsiveness and readiness of its members.

Incidents

Across the Zone our Brigades responded to a total of 3496 Incidents during the 2010/11 reporting period. The table below details the responses by Council area and the historic totals since 2005/06.

The total incidents increased by 56 on the previous year, but is significantly down on what would be termed "average" as represented in the 2006/07 year, where total incidents are in excess of 500 for the reporting year.

Non Bush/Grass Fire Incidents

Of those incidents listed in Table 9 the below listed Table 10 identifies those incidents that are not fire related but rather Motor vehicle accidents (MVA's), false alarms and good intent calls.

There is another measure of Brigade activity that counts total *actual* responses which is a true measure of total Brigade activity. It has been a Canobolas Zone practice for some time, particularly during the summer months, to respond multiple brigades to reported incidents to ensure rapid containment and sufficient personnel resources. By capturing the primary AND supporting brigades who are responded to each reported incident, a true picture of the activity level can be appreciated. Table 11 highlights this activity.

Out of Area Assistance

Canobolas Zone has an Out of Area Assistance Plan that establishes the protocols and resources available to immediately assist our neighbouring Districts following any request.

During the reporting period resources were dispatched to Dubbo during the flood crisis that impacted upon that town during December 2010. This deployment consisted of two group support vehicles and 6 personnel for one only 12 hour shift.

Two additional personnel had also been deployed to assist with aviation communications based at Dubbo SES HQ assisting with the airlift and helicopter operations west of Nyngan and Coonamble. These deployments were for a 72 hour duration each and provided a valuable opportunity for our aviation communications operators to exercise their skills in a multi agency response.

Other Assistance

During December 2010 Canobolas Zone RFS crews also provided valuable assistance to the SES and Police during the Flood Emergencies across our own area through the provision of manpower, pumping capability and use of high clearance vehicles to alleviate the impact of rising water as a result of significant rainfall events.

The most significant operations were those at

5. Infrastructure and Assets

5.1 Tanker Replacement Plan

Funding of \$1,117,212 was allocated for replacement of new and refurbished fire fighting vehicles during 2010/11 and the Zone was able to place 14 new and refurbished tankers into the Cabolas Zone Brigades, the detail of which is listed Table 12.

This year saw the introduction of 6 new Cat 9 strikers that have been principally allocated into Blayney Brigades, allowing a number of existing diesel Cat 9's to be transferred internally to other Districts across the Zone, eventually retiring much older strikers from the fleet.

The seven refurbished vehicles received through the RFS 2nd hand tanker program have been systematically received and delivered to the various brigades allowing for a number of category changes where some Cat 7 tankers have been upgraded to Cat 2 tankers and therefore boosting the water capacity.

The receipt of new tankers into the fleet always promotes opportunities to effect a number of internal transfers between Brigades and Districts within the Zone. The primary purpose of these transfers is to ensure that the oldest vehicles are made redundant whilst ensuring the appropriate level and type of resource is being installed to match the operational need of each Brigade area.

5.2 Maintenance

All fire fighting vehicles were treated to either a Minor or Major service simultaneous with a roadworthy inspection and an inspection of the fire fighting apparatus. These works commenced from July 2010 and concluded during December 2010.

The Service centres for these works are decentralised to limit the amount of travelling required by volunteers, as well as constrain the fuel expenditure. These centres have all been selected for their capability and expertise in providing the required maintenance for heavy vehicles and have all gained the certification required to perform the RTA HVIS (Heavy Vehicle Inspection Scheme).

The approved service centres are:

- PGR Truck Repairs
- Cowra Truck Wreckers
- Molong Tyre & Mechanical

5.3 Station Upgrade Program

The NSW Rural Fire Fighting Fund allocated \$466,855 for brigade Station funding for the 2010/11 financial year. This will allow for the erection of a shared brigade facility at Lake Canobolas for the Nashdale and Canobolas Brigades along with the building of a new 2 bay standard design station at Darby's Falls.

Remnant funds will see contribution towards finalising the planning for a standard design station at March (Clergate).

It is anticipated that Canobolas Zone will build these new facilities through a project management framework rather than tender for design and construct in an effort to maximise the use of the available funds.

5.4 Fire Control Centre Usage

The Canobolas Zone continues to be used on a regular basis for State, Regional and Zone meetings and training events. Several Government Departments and private businesses also hire our rooms for activities and training sessions.
