Congratulations to graduating Windsor High School cadets

Nine students from Windsor High School have graduated from the RFS Secondary School Cadet Program today, after successfully completing the 13-week course.

RFS Superintendent Karen Hodges said the program is the ideal way to introduce young people to the important role volunteer firefighters play within communities.

“These cadets have completed a program that has given them skills which will last a lifetime,” Superintendent Hodges said.

“As well as examining fire behaviour, the students were taught essential fire safety techniques and gained an appreciation of the work our emergency services do every day in this state.
