Celebrations for graduating Wollondilly Anglican College cadets

Eight students from Wollondilly Anglican College were congratulated today by NSW Rural Fire Service (NSW RFS) Southern Highlands Manager Superintendent Martin Surrey for their successful completion of the NSW RFS Secondary School Cadet Program.

Superintendent Surrey said the program is the ideal way to introduce young people to the important role volunteer fire fighters play within communities.

"The cadets have completed a course that ran over 10 weeks that has given them skills which will last a lifetime," Superintendent Surrey said.
